THE WAR MEMORIAL TABLETS AND THE VETERANS WALL OF HONOR: A CHRONOLOGY Compiled by Geoffrey Williams, University Archivist Emerius, 2018

1894. June 28

At the School's Semi-Centennial Jabilee Alumin Association President Millford H. Smith 79 suggests the Association raise funds for a Soldieris Memorial Tablet honoring the School's Civil War dead. In 1896 Albert N. Husted SNS '75, a long-time faculty member and lieutenant and subsequently captain of the Normal School Company was designated charman of the fund-nising committee. 1900, June 14

At the conclusion of a successful alumni fund-raising campaign, the Soldiers Memorial Tablet honoring the State Normal School's Civil War dead was unwelled in the Normal College's Willest Street Building. (Report of the Reunion, June 14-15, 1900, Alumni Association Minutes, Vol. 1872-1917, p. 79, Alumni Association Records)

1906, January 6

The Willett Street building burns, destroying most historical records, the Alumni Memorial Window, the Soldiers Memorial Tablet and all the oil portraits of principals, presidents, and executive committee members that were hung in the gutted Assembly Hall. (Executive Committee Minutes, Jan. 15, 1906, p. 631 (transcription)

1907, February

Second fund-raising campaign began for Civil War Memorial Tablet launched by the Metropolitan Alumni Association at its February meeting. A.N. Husted SNS '55 was named chair of the fund-raising committee at the Annual Meeting in June. (Annual Reunion Minutes, June 22-23, 1908, Alumni Association Minutes, 1872-1917, p. 1111-12)

1910, June 20

The second Soldiers Memorial Tablet, costing \$411.71, is installed in the Administration Building (subsequently Daper Hall) entrance hall on the newly opened (1909) Western Avenue campus. It replaced the original tablet lost in the 1906 fire. (Annual Reunion Minutes, June 20-21, 1910, Alumni Association Minutes, 1872-1917, pp. 134, 1910.

1920, June 19

WWI Soldiers Memorial Tablet collection started at the suggestion of James Edsall, Class of 1884. (Annual Meeting Minutes, June 19, 1920, Alumni Association Minutes, 1917-1956, p. 48)

1921, June 19

WWI Soldiers Memorial Tablet Committee raises \$296.88 for tablet, which is installed on Alumn Day 1921 in the Administration Building Subsequently Draper Hall). Any surplus funds to be allocated to a new World Wm Memorial Fund for student brans. (Executive Committee Minutes, April 19, 1921 & Annual Meeting Minutes, June 19, 1921, Alumni Association Minutes, 1917-1956, pp. 55, 61)

1953. June 13

Dedication of WMII Memorial Tablet. The project was a joint Alumni Association and Student Association project. Conceived by the Student Association, it was suggested to the Alumni Association at the 1952 Alumni Reunion. The plaque may have been designed by Roger Vermans 153. 1966

The tablets were moved from Draper Hall to the new Administration Building on the Uptown Campus. They hung until 2000 in the west entrance to the Administration Building by the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs.

2000. Spring & Summer

The Uptom Campus Administration Building was vacated for an of Fcampus side on Western Annue adjacent to the Uptom Campus while the current Administration Building was being built. The Administration Building was converted into academic office and class space for the College of Arts and Sciences. The official date for the move was May 2000. The War Memorial Tablets were removed from the Administration Building for safe keeping and stored in the University Archives in the University Libraries. Christine Hanson McKinglif. "Master Plan. 2001, June 9

Dedication ceremony for the Veterans Wall of Honor honoring Albany faculty, staff, students and graduates who have served in the military since the founding of the school in 1844. The Wall consists of a nine panel, 36-foot long mural created by Albany artist Soll Taylor using snapphots and illustrations of service men and women. The Wall is mounted in the President's Lourge on the second floor of the University Library. The Veterans Wall was the brainchild of Gruince Whittlesey '44, a past president of the Albumi Association, Helen Brucker Martl 44 and Eleanor Alland' 48, She was joined by many alumni volunteers in a major research project to identify veterans and collect images of soldiers. The aim of this project was to reconnect the University with suduents, graduates, faculty and staff who had served or are serving their country in the military.
